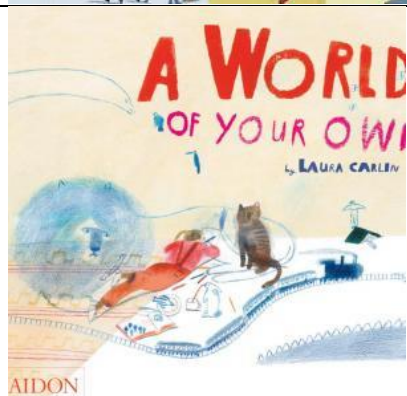
Much more than an identification guide to wild flowers, this book has been lovingly compiled to excite readers about its subject matter.

	Atlas of Adventures By Rachel Williams Each section of this large format book opens with a map of each continent then homes in on particular places with things you can do or see there.
	Barefoot Books World Atlas By Nick Crane This atlas enables readers to explore each region of the world, including its oceans, by focusing on environment and culture and the interdependency between humankind and nature.
	Can We Save the Tiger? By Martin Jenkins Two committed conservationists have created a thought-provoking book about the many creatures which are endangered due to human ignorance although interventions that have reversed these trends are also acknowledged.
	City Atlas By Georgia Cherry The double page spreads of this large format book each have a beautifully designed, stylised, colour co-ordinated map of a significant city, with an emphasis on Europe and the Americas.

		Fantastically Great Women Who Changed the World By Kate Pankhurst Kate Pankhurst, a descendent of suffragette Emmeline Pankhurst, has created a stimulating and entertaining book about women who have made a significant contribution to history.
		I is for India By Prodeepta Das In this updated edition of his photographic alphabet book first published 20 years ago, Prodeepta Das takes his readers on a tour through Odisha in eastern India and introduces them to many aspects
		Mad about Monkeys By Owen Davey This book makes use of an arresting colour palette, predominantly brown through to orange, red and pink on a creamy background and strongly defined shapes on each carefully designed spread.
		Mama Miti. Wangari Maathai and the Trees of Kenya By Donna Jo Napoli This picture book describes the life of Wangari Maathai who was the first African woman to win the Nobel Peace Prize for her work in encouraging the planting of forests in Kenya.

		Mirror By Jeannie Baker What links two families, one living in Sydney, Australia, the other in a village in southern Morocco?
		One Plastic Bag By Miranda Paul The true story of Isatou Ceesay who saw the problem that the proliferation of plastic bags was causing in her country, the Gambia, contaminating the environment and killing the goats that swallowed them.
		Poo: a natural history of the unmentionable By Nicola Davies This book explains the whys and wherefores of animal excretion. It covers the role of faeces in communication, as nourishment and its role in natural recycling in addition to providing clues to this as a means of animal identification.
		Professor Astro Cat's Frontiers of Space By Dominic Walliman Did you know that Europa, one of Jupiter's moons, is the most likely place in the solar system to have extra-terrestrial life? Or, if Earth was a cherry tomato, what size all the other planets would be?

		Something about a Bear By Jackie Morris A brown bear stares out solemnly from the cover of this beautiful book which depicts a variety of bears from around the world in their natural habitats.
		Stone Girl Bone Girl. The Story of Mary Anning of Lyme Regis By Laurence Anholt This picture book tells the story of Mary Anning emphasising the influence of her father on her developing interest in fossils.
		Tell Me a Picture By Quentin Blake Subtitled 'Adventures in looking at art' this book has its origins in Quentin Blake's time as the first UK Children's Laureate when he curated an exhibition at the National Gallery
		The Fossil Girl. Mary Anning's Dinosaur Discovery By Catherine Brighton In contrast to Laurence Anholt's interpretation of Mary Anning's life, this picture book focuses more specifically on the episode in which she finds the ichthyosaur.

	The Great Fire of London By Emma Adams Emma Adams' text evokes the sights and smells of 17th century London before giving a brief and atmospheric account of how the Great Fire of London began, how it was dealt with and its subsequent impact.
	The Great Kapok Tree By Lynne Cherry This picture book expresses clearly by means of vibrant illustrations and a patterned and poetic story, the importance of humans preserving the rainforests and the ecosystems within it for the sake of all who live on this planet.
	The Pebble in My Pocket. A History of Our Earth By Meredith Hooper This narrative takes the reader into the deep and distant past to witness the formation of the rock from whence came the pebble held by the child in the first picture.
	The Tudors. Kings, Queens, Scribes and Ferrets! By Marcia Williams The tale of Tudor times, from the Wars of the Roses to the death of Elizabeth I, filtered through the eyes and pen of Arthur Inkblott, a scribe at the court, with humorous accompanying asides.
